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
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# This months meeting

## **New Apiary & Study Centre – Help Required**


This is the moment we've been working towards for many years - it's almost time to put up our own apiary building!

The building itself will be delivered on Tuesday, 17th March in 'flat pack' and we need 'all hands-on deck' to put up the building, under the direction of our carpenter in the weeks that follow.

# Honeyland – a documentary film worth watching

Honeyland, which follows wild beekeepers in the small village of Bekirlija in North Macedonia, is on the shortlist for the 2020 Oscars and is the first film ever to be nominated for the Academy Awards for International Feature and Documentary Feature in the same year.

Honeyland is a documentary about the life and labours of Hatidže Muratova, a Macedonian beekeeper of Turkish descent who lives in the village of Bekirlija in the municipality of Lozovo. As the village is in a secluded mountain, she has no access to electricity or running water. She is one of the last wild beekeepers in the country and the continent.



Hatidže lives together with her 85-year-old partly blind bed-ridden mother, Nazife, who is completely dependent on her daughter's care. means of restoring balance in the ecosystem.

Fungal extracts were mixed into sucrose solution and fed to bees using in-hive feeders This is exemplified through moments when she chants the lines "half for me, half for you" to her bees when harvesting the honey. This principle is based on the customs and traditions of her ancestors, who taught her that bees need to use their own honey for nutrition to obtain more energy for flying and mating.

The documentary shows numerous shots of Hatidže during the beekeeping process, including the handling of the apiaries where the bees are kept and cutting honeycombs.



The peace and quiet of her home-place and routine life are disrupted by the arrival of Hussein Sam, a Turkish nomadic rancher who arrives with a trailer. Traveling with him are his wife Ljutvie, their seven children and several imported domestic animals.

Hatidže maintains good relationships with them and bonds with the family's children who frequently invade her privacy. She proceeds to pass on the advice she got from her ancestors to Sam, explaining to him the art of beekeeping and instructing him on how to start his own colony. In need of financial means to sustain his family, Sam decides to start his own colony of bees. Sam disregards her advice and proceeds to harvest the entire honey his beehives produce upon a customer's request to provide him with as much honey as possible. This leads to Sam's bees attacking Hatidže's in order to obtain honey during the resource-scarce winter period, thus bringing an end to Hatidže's way of living. Hatidže scolds Sam for not following her advice as she finds her bee colony collapsing. Her mother also passes away and when the nomadic family decides to move on, she remains alone in the village. Apparently, filmmakers Ljubo Stefanov and Tamara Kotevska camped in Hatidže Muratova 's backyard for days at a time over the course of three years to capture the escalating drama; they succeeded so much that at times it's hard to believe *Honeyland* isn't scripted.

I watched the documentary film the other evening and it was certainly an eye opener into the sort of hard life that many people in our world have to endure. The film is very moving and shows how rapidly a sustainable form of natural beekeeping can be completely destroyed when you're your neighbours ignore the basic principles of living in harmony with the bees. There are some great scenes of how <u>not</u> to handle bees and I was left wondering how Sam and his children ever survived the number of stinging bees that they had to deal with. It's easy to take sides and empathise with Hatidže and her plight, particularly as she sees her bee colony's collapsing for no fault of her own. However, don't be too hard on Sam. Just try to imagine how you would cope if you had to provide for a wife and seven children in such a harsh environment. The film is thought provoking and has some amazing shots of the wild Macedonian wilderness in which Hatidže and Sam and his family have to survive. Not everyone's cup of tea but I would recommend you give it a try. — Ed.

- The trench for the power cable has now been dug, the conduit is in and backfilled.
- Trees have been pruned.

# January's Positive Thinking - Newsletter from Margret Wilson, President of BBKA.



Dear Members,

First of all, Happy New Year to everyone, let's hope that 2020 is a good one for everyone, hopefully for all mankind, not only the Beekeepers in the world, a frail hope, but it would be good if it could happen.

Back to the beekeeping world, yesterday Saturday 11th January was the day of the Annual Delegates Meeting, where all but a few associations sent their delegates to the meeting to see what has happened to the BBKA in 2019 and to make suggestions for the coming year, it is always an interesting meeting, never going exactly how it is anticipated, but that is a good thing, it certainly prevents complacency.

The first two sessions were on annual reports of happenings and the finances for the past year, which we are pleased to say were good, once again. This is the fourth year that we have had a surplus which means no increase in capitation once again.

We then went on to applications for membership and once again Laddingford asked for membership, this was supported by their current host association and the vote was taken but on a member vote, the application was then lost. This is the second time that Laddingford had applied and been refused.

The nominations for President, new Trustees and the exam board were all approved, so we go into the new year with a full board of Trustees.

We then went onto the ratification of the Trustee Discipline and dispute procedure and with one minor change completed immediately, that too was approved.

Last year we asked for volunteers to be the Treasurer for the BBKA however there were no applicants and as we had just covered two years without a Treasurer and with the new robust system in place it was felt that we no longer needed one, that too was passed.

We then had some changes to the eReturn2 (eR2) membership database explained by Martin Smith and all approved, I believe that every association will already have the details of the changes now.

The West Sussex proposal regarding proxy voting failed so we will carry on as we have before.

The proposition from Newcastle to change Chairman to Chair was approved.

Martin Smith then took the stand to talk about the Yearbook, indicating that this would now be available on the eR2 system.

There was a proposition from Surrey regarding insurance for the AHAT teams, but we had put that in place with our insurers in 2019, Bob Maurer spoke about it and thanked David Hudson from the Insurance company for his time in explaining the cover available to trained officers

We than had the proposition from Buckinghamshire regarding pollinator awareness within the professionals at Town Halls and Landscape institutions, this was passed but I have to say that Pam Hunter is and has already been involved in this sphere and she explained that it is difficult to actually get to speak to the correct people in such establishments but that the BBKA does work with other agencies who are trying to do the same.

As requested by Essex, it was agreed that the BBKA should apply to join Apimondia via CONBA.

It then remained for Margaret Murdin to present the new president with the Chain of Office, this was completed, and I humbly accepted the Chain.

The meeting could not close without thanking Margaret Murdin for the contributions she has made to the BBKA in her 8 years as Trustee, Vice Chair, Chair and President. Not even including her continuing contributions to the exam board throughout this time.

The ADM is a time for meeting beekeepers from across the country and catching up with friends you only meet occasionally, I do hope that everyone who attended had a good day and it was also good that we did in fact manage to end the meeting in daylight, as per the request of many delegates who had driven to the event.
