
Summer 2022

This season's to do list;

Reduce hive entrances

Wasps and robbing colonies will soon be about, so pop a hive entrance reducer to help your bees defend a smaller space.

Re-use propolis!

Propolis - an annoying sticky substance, or an amazing natural substance that repairs holes and cracks on the outside of your hives? Stop water and draughts coming in the bee-tter way.

Give smaller colonies a helping hand

Now is the time to think about your smaller colonies - are they going to grow big enough in time before the Winter? Consider uniting them or feeding them to give them a boost.

How Temperature Affects Honey;

Ever wondered the best temperature to use after harvesting your honey?

For **filtering**, the best temperature to use is between 35C and 38C, and the honey needs to be at this temperature for 3-4 days. However, if you're filtering Ling Heather honey, then it needs 49C instead.

Becareful going too high;

Becareful going too high in order to get quicker results, because going above 71C will **burn and spoil** your honey.

Though, if you want to **blend your honeys** together to get a unique mixture, then 49C is the best temperature to use to ensure all your different types of honey are runny enough to mix well.





Go too low, and you'll get crystallization;

Going below 14C will begin the **crystallization process**, and warming it back up to 32C for around 3 days will then produce **soft set honey**.

And if you're worried about fermentation, warming your honey up to 63C for 30 minutes will **destroy yeasts**.





We eventually found the bee bole and recently had it rebuilt and had it registered with the National Bee Bole Register (IBRA Number 1600).

The small skep started getting a bit of attention from a small swarm and I put some lemongrass oil on the larger skep and a few days later it was visited by (what we consider) to be a massive swarm.

The skep is currently full of brood and honeycomb!
